7. Historical data. Explain the historical/architectural importance of this area.

The South Green is a microcosm of the social and architectural history of Ipswich. Though the 17th century houses originally in the area, including those of such eminent early inhabitants as Rev. John Rogers, Nathaniel Ward, and Ezekial Cheever are now gone, the John Whipple House represents that era very well (see form #40). Moved from a site across the Ipswich River to its present lot at the north end of the Green in the 1930's, this mid-17th century house is a National Historic Landmark. The rest of the Green is bordered by Georgian, Federal, Greek Revival, and Victorian houses, as well as a mid-18th century cemetery. The Nathaniel Wade House c. 1727 (see form #14), John Heard House, c. 1795 (see form #41), Locke's Folly, 1835-37 (see form #8), and "The Gables", c. 1846 (see form #42) are among the most notable houses ringing the ancient training field.

The South Green dates from 1686, when the town voted that the area be held in common, and it has fulfilled various community needs. Cattle were gathered here to be driven to outlying pastures. All adult men reported monthly to the Green for military training. Above all, the South Green was the educational center of Ipswich. In fact, it was first known as the School House Green.

As early as 1636 a Grammar School was established in Town. Ezekial Cheever, famous New England educator, came to Ipswich in 1650 as schoolmaster. The first schoolhouse was built on the corner of Poplar and County Rds. by 1652 and Cheever taught there until 1660. The Grammar School remained in this location until 1704, when it was moved to the new Town House on Meeting House Green. In the mid-18th century Madam Rogers, wife of Samuel Rogers, kept a school for young ladies in her home at the north end of South Green. In 1794 the Grammar School moved back to the area into a new building on the corner of County and "rgilla Rds.

From 1828, the South District of town shared the building for its own school, and in 1836 the Grammar School merged with a new English High School. That merger brought radical changes in the scope and purpose of the Grammar School, and many mark that date as the passing of the ancient school.

The second district school moved to a new building nearby at Payne and Poplar Sts. about 1850, and the High School left the old South Green building in 1874.

Today the South Green is no longer the educational center of Ipswich, but


it is still a center for community activities and is the site of some of the finest 17th, 18th, and 19th century homes in Ipswich.

Boundary Description and Justification:

The boundaries of the South Green essentially were determined when the Green was set aside by the town over 300 years ago, and today they remain nearly the same. The Heard House marks the Northwest corner, then the boundary line runs south to Saltonstall's Creek, crosses County Rd., then runs north to the Swasey Tavern, which marks the northeast corner. The line then runs west to the northwest starting point. The boundaries were pre-determined by the structures in the area, which all relate directly to the Green and Saltonstall's Creek creates a natural southern boundary.

The district has minimal intrusions, most dating to the 19th century. Condition, synthetic siding, age, and lesser architectural or historical interest characterize the intrusions. Though they do not make a direct contribution to the district, the intrusions are nonetheless supportive, and the area would be poorer without them.
